## A. COURSE DESCRIPTION

This online course will introduce health care professionals to oncology. Oncology patients receive care from all health care settings – including tertiary care centres, general hospitals, community care clinics, long term care and home care. They receive care from many health care professionals, depending on their disease, treatment and needs. Given the increasing complexity of this growing patient population, caring for people with cancer and their families involves a particular set of skills and knowledge from a variety of health care professionals.

This course will introduce the essential concepts in oncology, and provide fundamental information to those who work with oncology patients and their families.

Although learners can complete the various components of the course at their own pace, the course must be **completed in its entirety** within **ten weeks** of the course start date (this date can be found on the course information page in *My Account*).

## B. COURSE OBJECTIVES

By the end of this course, you will be able to:

- Briefly review normal cell biology and lab values
- Explain key concepts of cancer, including genetics and carcinogenesis
- Explain how a diagnosis of cancer is made, the diagnostic testing necessary to identify stage of disease, and the current treatments available for cancer
- Describe the psychosocial aspects of cancer including screening for distress and sexuality
- List some of the common survivorship issues
- List and describe six common symptoms of cancer, their assessment and management

## C. MODE OF LEARNING

### *eLearning*

eLearning is the primary mode of learning for this course. eLearning is offered through the de Souza eLearning centre, and will cover the following activities: the acquisition of knowledge via self-directed reading and module activity completion, and knowledge assessment via quizzes and tests. The eLearning environment fosters a self-directed approach for participants to progress through the modules at a convenient time, either at home or work.

- Learning and application: Sections and modules are developed by the de Souza education team to reflect the latest knowledge in Oncology Practice. The content is up to date and the learning format is interactive.
- Knowledge assessment: see more detailed description under section D.
- Technical support will be provided throughout the course.

## D. MODES OF EVALUATION

As part of the evaluation process, you are required to complete the following:

- A baseline evaluation: this survey assesses your knowledge, attitude, and confidence before you begin the eLearning modules for the course.
- eLearning modules and quizzes (**see Section G – Course Timeline, for more details**).
- Knowledge assessment:
  - **Sections 1-5**  
Participants will be tested on their knowledge after Sections 1-5 by completing a 35 question quiz.  
Participants must successfully answer 25/35 questions correctly (71%) to pass.  
There is a time limit of 45 minutes for this quiz.
  - Participants will have a maximum of two attempts for this quiz.
  - **Note:** The final course grade is based on completion of the **mandatory modules** and the **Quiz for Sections 1-5**.
  - **Section 6 (optional)**  
Participants are encouraged to complete 6 case studies in Section Six (six symptoms – five questions per symptom for a total of 30 questions).  
**Note:** There is no time limit for these case studies.
- Post evaluation: At the end of the course, you will be required to complete the online post course evaluation through eLearning.

When you have successfully met all the above requirements, you will receive an email containing instructions on how to download your certificate of completion, and will receive credit towards obtaining your de Souza designation.

## E. TIME REQUIREMENT AND EXPECTATIONS FOR PARTICIPANTS

To be successful in completing this course, you are encouraged to set aside 2-3 hours each week to complete each section, as learning is primarily self-directed. The expected number of hours to complete this course is 20 hours.

Sections and modules are to be completed sequentially; participants can choose to go ahead and complete learning activities in multiple sections and modules at once, however, all course requirements must be completed within 10 weeks.

Your course activity completion will be reflected in your grade book. You will be expected to complete all six sections (22 modules) through the eLearning system. It is strongly recommended that participants not plan a vacation during the course period.

## H. FACILITATOR'S BIOGRAPHY

Donalda has been an oncology nurse for 42 years, 35 years working in clinical oncology at Mount Sinai Hospital in Toronto, where she worked with both inpatients and outpatients, and with both solid tumours and hematological malignancies, and the last 7 as an educator at de Souza. Her lifelong education focus has been on the novice oncology nurse, whether that nurse is a new grad or someone transferring into oncology from another clinical area. Donalda has held certification in oncology from both the Oncology Nursing Society and the CNA since 1998. She has served on the board of directors for the Canadian Association of Nurses in Oncology for seven years, five of which she was treasurer. Donalda has done item writing and been a reviewer for the CNA oncology certification exam. She continues to be a mentor for those studying for the exam.

In 2008, Donalda was nominated by her oncology peers and was one of the 100 nurses from across Canada to receive the CNA Centennial Award honouring her work in education of novice oncology nurses. In 2014, she received the Lifetime Achievement Award from CANO.
